
Transformative Moments:

In the past five to seven years, Sadar, in association with donors, government agencies, & international organizations including the World Bank, IFAD, USAID, EU, DFID, Gates Foundation, UN, and INGOs, has undertaken extensive field monitoring, verification, research, and technical assessments.

These efforts covered over 3000 community sites spread across Somalia. Sadar boasts a team of 25 full-time research faculty and staff, supported by over 200 trained Somali speaking research assistants who have unparalleled access to all areas in Somali.





Sadar Thematic and Practice Areas

Health Systems:



Initiatives in this area focus on improving healthcare delivery, strengthening health infrastructure, and enhancing access to

quality healthcare services. Topics of interest include healthcare financing, healthcare workforce development, health information systems, and the integration of traditional and modern medical practices.

Emergency Response and Humanitarian Action:



Activities in this area aim to enhance prepared ness, response, and recovery mechanisms for natural disasters, conflicts, and other

humanitarian crises. Key focus areas include disaster risk reduction, humanitarian logistics, emergency medical care, and psychosocial support for affected populations.

Social Services and Economic Resilience:

THE RESILIENT LIVELIHOOD ACTION TO COVID-19 (RLAC-19)







Project Description:

With funding from IFAD, SADAR implemented an 18-month long Resilient Livelihood Action to COVID-19 (RLAC-19) project in Somalia in collaboration with Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation of the Federal Government of Somalia for the period October 2020 to June 2022. The project's goal was to reduce small-scale producers' vulnerability and enhance resilience to Covid-19 shocks of their livelihoods in the target areas. The project targeted a total of (4200 HH) of agro-pastoral communities in Puntland State (Qardho, Northern Galkacyo and Iskushuban Districts) and Galmudug State (Southern Galkacyo, Adado District and Hobyo Districts). The beneficiaries in the 6 target districts were all agropastoral except in Hobyo district which is predominantly a fishing community.

Outcomes:

The project achieved its objectives by maintaining and improving agricultural productive capacity of small-scale producers in the targeted areas through the availability of inputs, enabling a safe and sustainable food systems and market linkages supported through continued and improved supply chains and market access.

The total project target number of beneficiary household (HH) were 4200 HH. With the Minimum Integrated Packages per HH and in-depth community and government consultations, the project directly reached 4319 households making the total for both the original and additional beneficiaries 120% more than the original project target beneficiary households.

Project Description:

states and through collaboration between existing networks of local organizations is implementing The Response initiative for Somalia emergencies (RISE) project which is a country-driven process that fully reflects the federal government's request submitted to IFAD on 01 April 2022. The objective of the project is to contribute to the conducive Agro-ecological and market conditions, protecting productive livelihoods and tapping new market opportunities to reduce small-scale producers' vulnerability, enhancing resilience to the shocks from the Ukraine crisis on their livelihoods and improve their incomes. The project seeks to maintain and improve climate- smart agricultural productive capacity, post-harvest and resilient water infrastructure access for small-scale producers by supporting the agricultural productive capacity and functionality of food supply chains, resilient irrigation systems and domestic water supply infrastructure through innovations and technologies.



Project Target Groups

The project is primarily targeting small holder's farmers groups (Agropastoral communities) in the districts of Qardo and North Galkacyo in Puntland and Beledweyne and Jowhar districts in Hirshabelle State. The project is also supporting the fishing communities in Hobyo district of Galmudug state. The project also seeks to maintain and improve climate- smart agricultural productive capacity, post-harvest, and resilient water infrastructure access for small-scale producers by supporting the agricultural productive capacity and functionality of food supply chains, resilient irrigation systems and domestic water supply infrastructure through innovations and technologies.

IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

The RISE project was a one year project which started in 1st December 2022 and completed on 30th November 2023. It is aligned with national priorities and strategies as outlined in the Somalia National Development Plan for 2020 to 2024 (NDP-9 – Pillar 3 Economic Development and Pillar 4 Social Development) which is further aligned with mainstreaming the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) across the Government's agenda reflecting the principles of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.







KOBCIYE PROJECT





Project Description:

KOBCIYE project has been formulated under the Food systems lens in Somalia with the overall objective improving food security and nutrition of small holder farmers through strengthened resilience to shocks. The project will particularly focus on internally displaced persons, women, and youth. The aim will be for producer groups and smallholder farmer groups to strengthen their production capacity, improve household consumption of nutritious foods, increase commercialization and diversify livelihoods for improved overall income security.

The objective of the project is to develop and strengthen the smallholder farmer producer groups, including women and youth, with the aim of becoming all-inclusive, self-governing, and demand-driven community-based organizations, it is also to establish and expand production capacity of smallholder farmers, including women and youth, through increase in land productivity, adoption of climate-smart agriculture technologies, and good agriculture practices.

Outcomes:

- 1) Development and strengthening of smallholder farmer producer groups.
- 2) Expansion of production capacity.

 Increased quality production through climate-friendly technologies.
- 3) Opportunities for diversified livelihoods for women and youth through water harvesting systems.

Outputs:

- 1) Climate-smart agriculture techniques such as drip irrigation, solar water pumps, & greenhouse technology.
- 2) Training in good agricultural practices, digital and financial literacy, marketing concepts, and post-harvest management.
- 3) Provision of production inputs including seeds, tractors, post-harvest handling equipment, and organic fertilizer



Project Target Groups

The KOBCIYE project intervention is targeting Puntland's Bari region and 4 other sites under Bossaso district with total land size of 681 hectares benefitting a total of 1,300 Households. SADAR will ensure at least 30% of the beneficiaries are women, and 20% are youth participating in the producer farmer groups. The selection of the sites is based on WFP criteria that include accessibility and security, land ownership (smallholder famers with own plots and land to farm) land size and potential for arable farming, household/community vulnerability status, water access and potential for water sources, interest at household level farming, interest in voluntary participation in livelihood activities and proximity to villages, special attention will be made to ensure producer farmers groups have women and youth and vulnerable households with potential and ability to participate in the group.

- Community engagement and mobilization.
- Baseline assessment and needs identification.
- Capacity building and training.
- Resource provision.
- Establishment of producer groups.
- Infrastructure development.

ADAPTIVE AGRICULTURE & RANGELAND REHABILITATION (A2R2) PROJECT.



Project Description:

Contribute to land restoration, biodiversity conservation of degraded ecosystems, and improvement of adaptive capacity of vulnerable smallholder households through climate resilient sustainable natural resources. The objective is Enhancing the climate resilience of poor rural households in Somalia through sustainable natural resources management on multiple levels: improved water resources and rangelands management; eco-agriculture and climate-proof livelihoods; forest/habitat rehabilitation; improved governance and information systems for land degradation and biodiversity

genital mutilation (FGM/C) in Bari and Nugaal Regions of
Puntland State of Somalia

Outcomes:

- 1. Communities' capacity to prevent and respond to SGBV, with a special focus on traditional harmful practices like FGM/C, is strengthened through awareness creation activities, sensitization and meaningful engagement of key community actors.
- 2. Enhanced capacity among health facilities to provide a clinical, psychological and culturally accepted response to SGBV survivors with a special focus on management of RH complications due to FGM/C and de-medicalization of FGM/C practices.
- 3. Existing State (SA) and Non-State Actors (NSA) coordination framework strengthened, particularly the Inter-agency FGM/C task force to lobby and advocate for implementation of existing Somalia and international legal frameworks against SGBV with a special focus on FGM/C.

Outputs

- Communities' capacity to prevent and respond to GBV, with a special focus on traditional harmful practices like FGM/C, is strengthened through awareness creation activities, sensitization and meaningful engagement of key community actors.
- Enhanced capacity among health facilities (GGH, Bossaso Hospital and MCHs) to provide a clinical, psychological and culturally accepted response to GBV survivors with a special focus on management of RH complications due to FGM/C and de-medicalization of FGM/C practices
- Existing SA/NSA coordination framework strengthened, particularly the Inter-agency FGM/C task force to lobby and advocate for implementation of existing Somalia and international legal frameworks against GBV with a special focus on FGM/C.

Target Groups and Final Beneficiaries

In total, 68 organisations (SAs and NSAs) and 96 individuals (health actors) is the target group beneficiaries and in addition 11,200 women, girls, men and boys is the final beneficiaries of the project.

- (1) 48 NSA organisations will benefit from trainings and joint community outreach;
- (2) 96 health staff will benefit from trainings, TOTs and capacity building,

Project Description:



The Saving Lives and Livelihoods initiatives helped in the acquisition and deployment of vaccines for communities supporting the delivery of vaccinations to millions across the continent, laying the groundwork for vaccine manufacturing in Africa by focusing on human capital development, and strengthening the capacity of Africa CDC. SADAR is working in partnership with AMREF, African CDC and the Federal ministry of health in Somalia and Djibouti.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

- 1. Partnership and Scope: The initiative is a collaboration between SADAR, the Mastercard Foundation, Africa CDC, and The Ministry of Health in Somalia. It aims to save lives and support economic recovery in Africa post-COVID-19.
- 2. Focus on Immunization: Recognizing immunization as a crucial health intervention, the initiative prioritizes equitable access to healthcare, particularly in fragile and poor countries.

Outcomes:

- 1. Improved Vaccine Coverage: Increased uptake of COVID-19 vaccines across Africa, integrating them into routine immunization schedules.
- 2. Enhanced Health System Capacity: Strengthened human capital and infrastructure for vaccine manufacturing and distribution in Africa.
- 3. Economic Recovery: Contribution to the economic recovery of African countries post-COVID-19 pandemic.

Outputs:

- 1. Vaccine Acquisition and Deployment: Procurement and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines to targeted communities.
- 2. Capacity Building: Training programs to develop human resources for healthcare and vaccine manufacturing.
- 3. Infrastructure Development: Improvements in logistical and healthcare infrastructure to support vaccine delivery and surveillance

Project Location:

The initiative primarily focuses on countries in Africa, with specific partnerships noted in Somalia and Djibouti.

Duration: The initiative is designed as a three-year program.

Target Beneficiaries:

- 1. Communities in Africa: Specifically, those in fragile and poor countries.
- 2. Healthcare Workers: Capacity building and training initiatives target healthcare professionals.
- 3. Governments and Health Agencies: Collaborative efforts with national ministries of health and Africa CDC to enhance health system resilience and vaccine delivery

IMPLENTATION STRATEGY

The implementation of the Saving Lives and Livelihoods initiative will synergize the efforts of the Federal government of Somalia, the Republic of Djibouti, Africa CDC, and AMREF and other partners in increasing COVID-19 vaccine uptake through campaigns that will focus on Risk Communication and Community Engagement (RCCE), vaccine capacity, logistics, and vaccine surveillance to enable the Federal Republic of Somalia and its member states to reach its COVID-19 vaccination target by integration COVID-19 vaccination into routine immunizations. Even though there has been a tremendous increase in resources available for health care delivery from donors to combat global epidemics, including the Global Fund for AIDS, TB, and Malaria; a weak health system characterised by health worker shortages have led to a lack of preventive, curative and health promotion programs, making it unlikely the world's poorest countries to achieve the Millennium Development Goals. This task has been exacerbated by changing global climate phenomena that has disproportionately affected health care delivery in the developing countries.

CGPP TRAINING FOR HEALTH WORKERS - VACCINATION



Project Description:

World Vision has contracted Amref Health Africa to roll out the Core Group Partners Project (CGPP) in Djibouti for one year. The project aims to enhance the Ministry of Health's capacity to increase the uptake of COVID-19 vaccination integrating COVID-19 surveillance routine immunization with (RI), surveillance. and building the technical capacity community based health of workers for improved community engagement and social mobilization activities. As part of the activities to strengthen routine vaccination and that of COVID 19, the Ministry of Health has put in place an advanced strategy in order to further vaccinate the Djiboutian population but also the migrant population who are passing through the countries. of the Arabian Gulf. This strategy aims to vaccinate migrants on the migratory routes but also at the level of the capitals of these 3 regions, this is in collaboration with AMREF Nairobi and the Djibouti office of the Sadar Institute

Project Objectives

The objectives of this training project include:

- Vaccination Protocol: Providing training on COVID-19 vaccines, including their efficacy, storage requirements, administration techniques, and addressing vaccine hesitancy.
 Ensuring healthcare workers are well-versed in the latest developments and guidelines related to COVID- 19 vaccination and routine immunization.
- Teamwork and Interpersonal Skills: Training the team to work as a ream and respect the dignity of each person being vaccinated and members of the team.
- Community Engagement: Providing communication skills training to the team to effectively communicate with communities, address vaccine-related concerns, and promote the importance of both COVID-19 vaccination and routine immunization.
- Safety Protocols: Training workers in implementing safety protocols during vaccination sessions. This includes activities such as proper use of equipment, maintaining hygiene and implementing efficient crowd management techniques
- Monitoring and Reporting: Educating the team on the importance of accurate data collection, monitoring vaccine coverage and reporting events and other activities

- Enhanced Technical Proficiency: Training healthcare workers on COVID-19 vaccine efficacy, storage requirements, administration techniques, and addressing vaccine hesitancy.
- Improved Supervisory Effectiveness: Ensuring teams are trained to work respectfully and efficiently during vaccination sessions.
- Strengthened Community Engagement and Collaborative

Partnerships:

Enhancing communication skills to engage communities effectively and build partnerships with organizations like AMREF Nairobi and the Djibouti office of the Sadar Institute.

- Mitigation of Misinformation and Adaptability to Challenges: Educating workers to address vaccine-related concerns and implement safety protocols.
- Positive Feedback and Confidence Building: Fostering confidence in vaccination through effective communication and technical proficiency.
- Building Sustainable Capacities: Developing long-term strategies for maintaining and expanding vaccination efforts beyond the project's duration.

Locations:

• Djibouti: Primarily focused on the capital and migratory routes through collaboration with partners and local health authorities.

Duration:

• One year: The project was set to run for one year, indicating a focused effort within this timeframe to achieve its objectives.



CGPP TRAINING FOR HEALTH WORKERS - VACCINATION



Target Beneficiaries:

- Community-Based Health Workers: Trained to administer COVID-19 vaccines and routine immunizations effectively.
- Djiboutian Population: To increase vaccination coverage against COVID-19 and routine immunizations.






CAPACITY STRENGHTHENING FOR FRAGILE CONTEXTS (C4FC):







OBJECTIVES

The objective of the C4FC project is to establish and promote an ecosystem for peer-to-peer learning, scaling, and adaptive management that will strengthen the organizational systems of selected LNGOs, support the established humanitarian architectures in these countries and provide innovative approaches to strengthen the capacity of local organizations who are on the front-lines of responding to humanitarian disasters. To this effect SADAR Institute is leading a co-creative process between INGO, LNGOs, government and partners to identify the existing best practices in disaster risk management planning, incorporate indigenous practices and insight and develop a Community Driven Resilience approach.

Outcomes: The outcomes expected from the Capacity Strengthening for Fragile Contexts (C4FC) project include:

- 1. Enhanced Organizational Systems: Strengthened capacity of 31 Local Nongovernment Organizations (LNGOs) in Somalia, Sudan, and South Sudan through peer-to-peer learning, adaptive management, and scaling of best practices.
- 2. Improved Humanitarian Architecture: Support for established humanitarian architectures in the target countries, facilitating more effective and sustainable responses to humanitarian disasters.
- 3. Innovative Approaches: Introduction of innovative approaches in disaster risk management planning and community-driven resilience, integrating indigenous practices and insights.

Outputs:

The specific outputs of the C4FC project:

- 1. Development and implementation of peer-to-peer learning mechanisms among LNGOs.
- 2. Scaling up of effective organizational practices within LNGOs.
- 3. Adaptive management strategies implemented by LNGOs to enhance flexibility in response to humanitarian challenges.
- 4. Community-driven resilience approach developed and implemented in collaboration with local communities and partners.

Duration: Three years

Location: The project is implemented in three countries:

- 1. Somalia: Specifically targeting 11 LNGOs.
- 2. Sudan: Targeting 10 LNGOs.
- 3. South Sudan: Also targeting 10 LNGOs.

SUPPORT TO COVID-19 VACCINATION IN DJIBOUTI







Project Description:

Djibouti, located in the Horn of Africa, has a population of slightly over 1 million predominantly people, residing in Djibouti City. The country serves as a stratetransit hub due to its location gic near the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden. As of April 1, 2023, Djibouti reported 15,690 total COVID-19 cases and 189 deaths, with a Case Fatality Rate of 1.2%. By January 21, 2023, 357,617 individuals 66.53% of the target population) (representing had received at least one COVID-19 vaccine dose, with 337,252 individuals fully vaccinated.

Despite these efforts, there's a pressing need to improve Routine Immunization coverage, particularly due to an increase in zero-dose children (16.5%) observed between 2020-2022. Djibouti City alone houses 60% of these zero-dose children, presenting an opportunity to integrate COVID-19 vaccination with Routine Immunization efforts. Challenges to vaccination uptake include access, equity, vaccine hesitancy, community health-seeking behaviors, education gaps, and logistical issues.

Project Goal and Objectives:

Goal

Enhance the Ministry of Health's capacity to support Risk Communication and Communication Engagement (RCCE), bolster vaccination strategies, and strengthen institutional capacity at national and regional levels, including Africa CDC.

Objectives:

- Objective 1: Support RCCE efforts to increase vaccine demand and reduce hesitancy.
- Objective 2: Assist in developing and executing effective vaccination strategies and campaigns.
- Objective 3: Enhance national and regional institutional capacity, including Africa CDC, to tackle vaccination challenges and broader health issues.

Outcomes:

- 1. Increased vaccine uptake among targeted populations, including men, women, and children.
- 2. Reduced vaccine hesitancy through informed community engagement and education.
- 3. Strengthened health systems capacity to manage vaccination programs effectively.
- 4. Improved Routine Immunization coverage, particularly among zero-dose children in urban areas like Djibouti City.

Outputs:

- 1. Development and dissemination of tailored RCCE materials targeting diverse communities and regions.
- 2. Training programs for health workers and community leaders on effective vaccine communication and administration.
- 3. Establishment of robust logistical frameworks for vaccine distribution and storage.
- 4. Implementation of integrated vaccination campaigns targeting both COVID-19 and Routine Immunization.

Target Beneficiaries

- Direct beneficiaries include healthcare workers, community leaders, and the general population of Djibouti, particularly those in high-risk groups and urban centers.
- Indirect beneficiaries encompass broader regional populations benefiting from enhanced health system capacities and reduced disease transmission risks.

Location:

• Primarily focused on Djibouti City initially due to high concentrations of zero-dose children, with potential expansion to rural areas based on project outcomes and needs assessment.

Implementation Strategy:

The project will adopt a phased approach:

- Phase 1: Assessing current RCCE strategies and vaccination programs.
- Phase 2: Tailoring interventions based on assessment findings, focusing on RCCE enhancement and logistical improvements.
- Phase 3: Implementing integrated vaccination campaigns and evaluating impact.
- Phase 4: Scaling successful strategies and institutionalizing improvements within national health frameworks.



HIIRSHABELLE FARMERS FLOURISH: SADAR INSTITUTE HELPS COMMUNITIES ACHIEVE SELF-SUFFICIENCY

"For me, this is historic because for the first time in many years, I was able to plant high-quality seedlings and, as a result, harvested high-quality crops," says fifty-four-year-old Hindi Abdullahi Farah, a veteran farmer in Baledweyne, a district in Hirshabelle regional state in Somalia. Hindi, who has been a farmer for decades, practises the trade along the River Shabelle banks and takes a walk on her farm.

"A lot has changed in the last one and a half years since I started enjoying the support I got from SADAR Institute" she adds as she picks fresh fruits from her farm. "I have not only secured food for our families, but I have also managed to sell the surplus crops, generating the much-needed income for the family." She says with a big smile on her face.

This newfound financial security for farmers in the Hirshabelle region follows an extensive resilience program implemented by the SADAR Institute, which targeted local farmers in Central Somalia.

The project known as RISE—The Response Initiative for Somalia Emergencies Project—targeted five villages, meticulously selecting 1,000 beneficiaries—200 from each village. Special consideration was given to the most vulnerable members of the community, including women, minorities, and those most receptive to adopting new practices.

"We conducted a thorough assessment to understand the needs of the local communities," explains Abdullahi Abdi Ali, Director of Planning and Policy at Hirshabelle's Ministry of Planning, adding that "It became evident that these riverside farmers lacked the tools and resources to utilize their fertile land fully."





From the onset, the project quickly addressed the identified gaps and needs. The selected beneficiaries were provided with essential tools like walking tractors, alleviating the burden of manual labour. In addition, they have also received high-quality, disease-resistant seeds for maize, beans, and a variety of vegetables like tomatoes and watermelons.

The impact has been remarkable, following the support the selected farmers received. For example, Ali Abdullahi Lebow, a 45-year-old beneficiary, beams with pride as he recounts his experience. "The project has been a game-changer. We've seen a significant improvement in our farms as we harvested better yields."

In addition to the farm equipment and the high quality and disease-resistant seedlings, the success of the River-line project also hinges on fostering knowledge. "We conducted awareness campaigns across the region," says Director Ali, "to identify vulnerable groups and educate them on the best practices for utilizing the provided equipment and seeds."

Director Ali further states that the result of the project is magnificent, borrowing from his recent visit to a village called Qoyda: "We have observed first-hand the stark difference between the use of the seedlings provided by Sadar Institute and those the farmers bought the local market. Clearly, farmers who have used the high-quality seedlings had flourishing, high quality and disease resistant crops, compared to those using local market seeds."

Despite existing challenges, such as climate change-induced floods, the RISE project in Hirshabelle is a testament to the transformative power of targeted intervention. By empowering local communities, particularly women farmers, with the right tools, knowledge, and high-quality resources, the SADAR Institute has created self-sufficiency and paved the way for a more prosperous future for Hirshabelle's riverside farmers.



REVIVING A LEGACY: HOW THE RISE PROJECT IS EMPOWERING HOBYO'S FISHING COMMUNITIES

Background

Hobyo, a coastal town in Somalia's Galmudug region, has a rich history and glorious past as one of the most vibrant trade hubs in the Horn of Africa. Strategically positioned near the Bab el-Mandeb Strait, a vital shipping lane, Hobyo teemed with merchants and fishermen for centuries.

However, following the collapse of Somalia's central government in the early 1990s, Hobyo faced a serious challenge—the vibrant trade was cut off, and the local communities, which mostly depended on fishing and trade, were left with nothing. With no meaningful support, local fishing communities resorted to using old and traditional fishing methods, which proved ineffective over time, and their catch dwindled.

And from 2009, as the conflict dragged on, the once vibrant fishing hub turned into a base for Somalia's pirates, who repeatedly hit international news headlines by targeting foreign ships and vessels and demanding huge ransoms.

Recognizing this untapped potential, the Sadar Development and Resilience Institute (Sadar) embarked on a transformative initiative. It implemented The Response Initiative for Somalia Emergencies Project (RISE) in Hobyo, targeting hundreds of local fishing communities.

RISE: Restoring Income and Securing a Future

The RISE project aimed to empower local fishermen and women by equipping them with the necessary tools and knowledge to thrive. Mustaf Abdifitah Sheikh, Sadar Field Officer for the Galmudug region, explained, "Sadar Institute implemented the project in phases. After a thorough assessment, we identified Hobyo as the most deserving location. The town's proximity to trade routes and its historical significance as a fishing hub made it prime for revitalization."





As part of the project implementation plan, local fishing communities were also trained on the best fishing practices. Mustaf Abdifitah Sheikh further explained the significance of the training on the best fishing practices: "The training on post-harvest loss for horticulture, grain and fish in the Galmudug state of Somalia, targeted local fishing communities and offered the best fishing practices, which included training on the use of selective fishing gear that targets specific species and sizes to reduce bycatch."

The project's core component involved distributing essential equipment. Hundreds of beneficiaries received fishing nets and lines, significantly enhancing their catch capacity. But the intervention went beyond mere tools. "Many lacked knowledge beyond traditional methods," says Mustafa. "They desperately needed coolers to preserve their catch, and RISE provided them with that critical equipment."

REVIVING A LEGACY: HOW THE RISE PROJECT IS EMPOWERING HOBYO'S FISHING COMMUNITIES



Forty-five-year-old Hawa Warsame Ilmi, a seasoned fisherwoman, reflects on the impact. "Before RISE, most of our catch would spoil. Now, we can store fish for days with the coolers, fetching a higher price at the market. This project has truly improved our lives."

Abdikadir Ali Yussuf, a young man in his early 20s who joined fishing after the project's influence, shared his experience. "Previously, fishing seemed like a dying profession. However, with training in best practices and new equipment, it's become a viable career option. I'm grateful for this opportunity."

Hobyo's District Commissioner Osman Ahmed Abdulle termed the project "the best they have had in recent years", adding ", As the local administration, we welcome the efforts by Sadar Institute in helping and empowering the local communities. This is already improving livelihoods and making people independent."

Beyond the Catch: A Ripple Effect of Prosperity

The impact of the RISE project on the fishing communities in Hobyo goes beyond increasing individual income. "The project has created a ripple effect," explains Mustafa. Household incomes have increased, leading to job creation for hundreds as the demand for fish has risen. We've seen a surge in the market value of fish, a stark contrast to the days when it would simply rot."

Hobyo's Renaissance: A Town Reclaiming Its Destiny

Hobyo's strategic location and historical significance as a trade hub are finding renewed relevance. The success of RISE has attracted new interest in the town, with people recognizing the potential for a thriving fishing industry. "The project served as a catalyst," Mustafa concludes. "It demonstrated the value of investing in Hobyo's fishing communities. With continued support, Hobyo can reclaim its position as a prominent trade hub and a beacon of prosperity for Somalia."

Conclusion

The RISE Project exemplifies the transformative power of targeted interventions. By equipping Hobyo's fishermen and women with the necessary tools and knowledge, Sadar has improved individual livelihoods and set the stage for the town's economic revitalization. Hobyo's story inspires, showcasing the potential for Somalia's coastal communities to thrive again.





A SEED OF HOPE BLOSSOMS IN SOMALIA: HOW RISE PROJECT IS HELPING FARMERS WEATHER THE STORM

On the 24th of February 2022, the World woke up to the news of the Russian army crossing over to Ukraine and undertaking what many called an invasion. To many in the Horn of Africa region, this was a faraway event that would not impact them.

However, the impact became apparent months and years later, especially in Somalia, where the cost of living skyrocketed due to the high cost of fuel and farm input, putting the country on the brink.

To respond to the ripple effect of drought and the high cost of living, the Sadar Development Institute implemented the Response Initiative for Somalia Emergencies Project (RISE), funded by the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), to empower small-scale farmers.

54-year-old Hawa Mohamed, a veteran farmer with eyes that hold the wisdom of countless seasons, leans on her hoe, surveying her land in the Bari region in Puntland, Somalia. "The past few years have been the hardest I can remember," she sighs. "The rains were scarce, the prices of everything skyrocketed, and it felt like there was no way out."

Hawa's story is not unique. It reverberates across Somalia. Farmers, the backbone of the nation, were being squeezed from all sides. The war in Ukraine had disrupted global food supply chains, sending fuel and fertilizer prices soaring. This, coupled with pre-existing vulnerabilities, such as the impact of climate change and decades of conflict, has plunged millions in the country deeper into hunger.





However, as the situation continued to deteriorate, Sadar Development Institute began to implement a timely initiative to respond to the unfolding crisis.

With funding from the UN's International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), it launched the Response Initiative for Somalia Emergencies Project (RISE).

Recognizing the dire situation, RISE targeted small-scale agro-pastoralists, Women and Youth in key regions, providing them with the tools they desperately needed.

Livestock, seeds, fertilizers, and farm equipment, became the instruments of a potential turnaround.

A SEED OF HOPE BLOSSOMS IN SOMALIA: HOW RISE PROJECT IS HELPING FARMERS WEATHER THE STORM

Malyuun Abdullahi, a determined female farmer, explained the significance of the intervention. "Before Sadar's intervention, middlemen would take advantage of us, buying our crops at low prices. Now, with the support of RISE, we're learning how to form cooperatives and negotiate better deals. This will allow us to keep more money in our pockets."

The project is still in its early stages, but the initial results are promising. Farmers like Hawa, Farah, and Muumina are brimming with optimism. They're not just planting seeds; they're planting hope for a brighter future. The harsh realities of Somalia haven't disappeared, but with RISE as their shield, these farmers are facing the storms with renewed strength.

"We are incredibly grateful for this project," says Hawa, a newfound glint in her eyes. "It's given us a chance to fight back, not just to survive but to rebuild our lives. For the first time in a long time, we can look forward to a harvest season filled with food and hope."

The story of RISE is a testament to the power of collective action. In the face of seemingly insurmountable challenges, a well-designed, targeted intervention can make a difference. As the project continues to unfold, it has the potential to be a beacon of light, guiding Somalia's farmers out of the darkness and toward a future of food security and prosperity.

Farah Mohamed, the local Chairman of the Qardho Farmers' Association, is grateful that Sadar Institute was able to undertake what he considers a lifesaving initiative. "These are game-changers," he exclaims. With these seeds and the new fertilizer, we can finally hope for a decent harvest. This will put food on our tables and allow us to earn a living again."

The RISE project, however, goes beyond immediate needs. It has three-pronged approaches: The first focuses on boosting agricultural productivity and capacity building. Farmers are not just given resources; they're also equipped with the knowledge to use them effectively. Training sessions cover topics like sustainable farming practices, soil conservation techniques, and water management. This empowers farmers to become more resilient in the face of future challenges.

The second component tackles the issue of food supply chains. By strengthening local markets and storage facilities, RISE aims to reduce post-harvest losses and ensure fair prices for farmers' produce. The final piece of the puzzle is financial inclusion. RISE facilitates access to financial services, including micro-loans and savings schemes. This empowers farmers to invest in their farms, diversify their crops, and weather unexpected economic shocks. The hope is to create a cycle of self-sufficiency where farmers can survive and invest in their future.

FROM PARCHED EARTH TO PLENTY: HOW THE KOBCIYE PROJECT IS REVIVING SOMALIA'S AGRICULTURE

Farming in Somalia remains one of the noble activities passed from generation to generation. It continues to support many families even as the country faces unimaginable threats caused by unpredictable weather patterns. For generations, farmers have wrestled with a harsh reality—an unforgiving climate, unpredictable rainfall, and a constant struggle to make life from the parched earth.

But amidst the dust and the heat, a quiet revolution occurs. Sadar Development Institute leads this revolution. Through its Kobciye project, which in Somali means "uplift", Sadar is injecting hope and prosperity back into the lives of these dedicated farmers.

"Before Kobciye," says 74-year-old Weris Adan, her weathered face creased with a smile, "we were always at the mercy of the rains. Sometimes, they'd come, and we'd have a small harvest. Other times, the land would be like a fist, clenched tight, refusing to give anything."

The project, implemented in four districts in the Bari region in Puntland, is a comprehensive package designed to empower farmers and unlock the region's agricultural potential. At the heart of the initiative is a shift away from the traditional, backbreaking methods and towards a future fueled by innovation.

One of the most visible changes is the arrival of vibrant green rectangles scattered across the landscape – greenhouses. These structures, a novelty in the region, provide a controlled environment where crops can flourish, shielded from the harsh sun and nurtured by drip irrigation systems.

"These greenhouses," exclaims Mohamud Mohamed, a veteran farmer with eyes sparkling with enthusiasm, "are like magic tents! We can grow tomatoes, peppers, even melons year-round, something unimaginable before."

Distribution of Seedlings

In addition to providing greenhouses, Sadar Institute also offers farmers free high-quality seedlings, ensuring a strong start for their crops. Gone are the days of relying on unreliable seeds passed down through generations.



But the real game-changer is the introduction of solar-powered water pumping systems. Previously, the long hours spent fetching water were a constant drain on time and energy. Now, with a flick of a switch, water flows readily, a precious commodity delivered straight from rehabilitated shallow wells.

Amina Said, a young, energetic farmer, beams as she remarks, "This is a gift from the heavens." Once roughened from hauling heavy water buckets, her hands tend to thrive in vegetable patches. "The time saved is unbelievable. We can dedicate that extra time to our crops, our families, to ourselves," she adds.

The impact of Kobciye goes beyond just water access. The project has introduced advanced irrigation systems, like drip irrigation, which conserves water by delivering it directly to the roots, minimizing waste. This reduces pumping needs and allows farmers to cultivate more land with less water.

"Every drop counts here," says 64-year-old Bashir Gurhan, a community leader. "Before, we lost so much water, and we used a lot of money to buy fuel to pump the water for irrigation, but now, each drop reaches the plant, maximizing our yields. It's a smarter way to farm."

The Magic use of Tractors

Farmers in the region have also benefited from tractors distributed by Sadar Institute, which are used to cultivate the land. The groups of farmers share the tractors, which are used by all the communities in the Bari region. Hassan Mohamed, an elderly farmer in Karin district, says the tractors have saved them a lot of money and time. "We used to pay not less than 200 dollars for five uses of the tractor when hired by private companies or individuals, but now we use it for free," says Hassan.

On the other hand, the Sadar Institute understands that a good harvest is only half the battle, which is why the Kobciye Project continues beyond the production level. To improve the quality of the harvest and ensure that crops are not damaged during the transportation process, farmers are now equipped with sturdy plastic crates for improved post-harvest handling. These crates help to keep fruits and vegetables fresh during transport, ensuring that they reach the market in top condition and fetch higher prices.



"Before we received the plastic crates, so much of our harvest would spoil on the journey to market. We can be confident that our hard work gets a fair reward." Said Mohamed Awad.

Beyond the Fields:

A Ripple Effect of Empowerment

The results of Kobciye are undeniable. Farmers report significant cost reductions, thanks to water efficiency and reduced reliance on traditional, expensive seeds. More importantly, they are experiencing a dramatic increase in their income.

"We're finally starting to see a future," says Bashir Gurhan. "We can pay for our children's education, improve our homes, and dream a little bigger. This project has given us hope; for a farmer, hope is the most valuable crop."



The Kobciye project is a beacon of success in a troubled region. It's a testament to the transformative power of innovation, tailored support, and a focus on empowering local communities. Amina Said concludes with a warm smile, "The desert may be vast, but the human spirit is even stronger. And with Kobciye at our side, we're finally starting to bloom."

The impact of Kobciye extends far beyond the farmers' fields. Increased income has stimulated the local economy, with businesses catering to the needs of the revitalized agricultural sector. Women, who traditionally play a vital role in food security, are finding new opportunities and a sense of empowerment.

"With my increased income," says Weris Said, "I can now contribute more to the household. I can buy food and clothes for my children. It's a sense of control I never had.





SHINING LIGHT IN THE SOMALI DESERT: A DATE PALM REVOLUTION WITH SOLAR POWER

Imagine a place where date palms, with their majestic fronds reaching for the sky, symbolize both life and struggle. This is what Abdikadir Abshir Noor, a seasoned date palm farmer in El-Dahir. Puntland. Somalia. dreams about.

For over four decades, Abdikadir has nurtured his date palms, facing the harsh realities of drought and unreliable energy sources. But a life-changing opportunity came knocking on his door in 2022 through an IFAD-funded program that helps farmers use new technology- the innovative Off-Grid Box (OGB) technology.



The OGB, a brainchild of the SADAR Development Institute and the European Committee for Training and Agriculture (CEFA), has become a beacon of hope in a region plagued by energy scarcity. This all-in-one solar system acts as a transformer, providing not just clean electricity but also purified water—a vital resource for Abdi's date palms and the surrounding community.

In December 2022, a high-level mission from IFAD witnessed firsthand the use of the Off Grid Box, piloted in regions within Puntland. As the arid landscape unfolded, they could not miss capturing the resilient date palm trees and the occasional cluster of mudbrick houses.

Abdikadir led the delegation to his farm, which is a testament to his dedication. The rows of date palms stand tall, their fronds rustling in the gentle breeze. However, a closer look reveals the struggle. The shallow well, Abdi's current water source, is far from the field. Irrigation relies on a fuel generator, a costly and polluting solution.



The IFAD delegation, led by the then Country Director Omar Njie, witnessed firsthand the challenges Abdi faces. "The cost of fuel for the generator is a constant burden," he explains, his voice laced with frustration. And the unreliable power supply disrupts the irrigation schedule, affecting the health and yield of my date palms."

Enter the OGB technology, a compact yet powerful unit resembling a giant metal box. The delegation watched with fascination as technicians installed the OGB, its double roof of solar panels gleaming in the sun. This innovation is about to change everything for Abdikadir and his community.

The Off Grid Box's magic lies in its ability to harness the region's abundant solar energy. The system pumps water from the well, delivering a life-giving elixir to the thirsty date palms.





However, the benefits extend beyond irrigation. The OGB also provides clean drinking water for local communities, which was a luxury before now.

The project continues beyond there. The OGB's surplus energy is a game-changer. It can power crucial devices such as refrigerators. The IFAD Delegation watched with excitement as Abdikadir used the electricity to power a small refrigerator, allowing him to store excess dates for extended periods. This innovation opens doors to new market opportunities and a potential increase in income.

The project's vision extends far beyond Abdikadir's farm—the OGB has the potential to serve as a community hub. The project plans to install a charging station for mobile phones, a vital tool for communication in remote areas. A water purification system could also provide clean drinking water for hundreds of households in the surrounding villages.

The impact of the OGB pilot project goes beyond its tangible benefits. It's a beacon of hope, a testament to human ingenuity, and a symbol of a brighter future for the El-Dahir people. Yussuf Abdi Maalim, the Sadar program Manager, was deeply moved by the project's potential.

"The OGB is more than just a solar system," he said. "It's a catalyst for change. It empowers farmers like Abdi, fosters a sense of community, and offers a sustainable solution to the region's challenges."

On the other hand, the use of this new technology illuminates the possibility of creating sustainable means of livelihood for communities.

Abdiqani Said Yussuf, Head of CEFA in Puntland, said, "This facility will serve as the main centre to sort, process and package the dates from across the region, and the farmer will not have to worry about their harvest going to waste' adding that this will add value to the crop and allow them to have a continuous market for their produce.

The future of the OGB project remains bright. With further funding and support, this innovative solution could illuminate countless lives, transforming not just farms but entire communities. The date palms of El-Dahir stand tall, no longer just symbols of struggle but also a blossoming date palm revolution powered by the transformative light of the sun.






