A couple of years ago, a young handsome Somali came to my office and said, you know Somalia needs peace, and I said, do you mean the Somalia where Mogadishu is? He said yes, and Today the rest is history. He said I would invite you to come to Somalia. At that point, from Ethiopia, there was no direct Ethiopian airways flight to Somalia, so we had to fly to Kenya and then to Mogadishu; flying into Mogadishu, you could see these beautiful sandy beaches.

I wondered what I was reading on international media, I asked whether it was the same place, but then everyone in Upeace seemed to talk about Professor Samuel, which is my first name. However, I have no power to decide to bring Upeace to Somalia or anywhere, so I will invite you today to give a hand of applause to the person who took that decision, and when he said go, I asked how? So I invite you to provide a writing of applause to my rector Dr Francisco. We are here todayToday because you made that decision mine was simply a recommendation, and the recommendation could be accepted or not. Today we are doing the 2nd graduation but the first graduation of PhD not only in Somalia but in Africa. The Africa program has been in Africa for 20 years. Still, we have the first doctorate graduation in Somalia, and I need to take you back to the discussions I had when writing the recommendation to establish Upeace in Somalia.

I had this conversation with my boss and he said, Samuel are you sure, I said yes I have been there and hugely when you talk about Somalia and Mogadishu everybody goes online and what they see is not what you are seeing here Today, they don't see graduation, they don't see the beautiful beaches like Lido Beach which I have been to several times, they don't see ordinary people going about their businesses, they don't see children going to school, they don't see people selling, they simply see insecurity, just one thing and that's what the Nigerian writer Ngozi Mwela said, the dangers of a single story, what's out there is a single story, now in this conversation which took place over a period of time, the question was how possible was it to establish Upeace here, then I in making argument said of course Upeace is the University of Peace, I always say it is a single subject university, if Upeace has to be in one place in Africa it has to be in Somalia because the mission of the University is to lesson the obstacles to peace and therefore I said, a doctor works in a hospital and we have to bring peace to anywhere it has to be Somalia because it was ground zero of conflict in Africa remember Dr Mohamed Osman talked about State collapse and thankfully the director accepted and we started making plans to establish the campus, now we decided deliberately to establish the campus out of the effort to make sure that there was access of somalis into the campus, we faced a few challenges and I am thankful and grateful that some of the people who stood by us including the number one citizen Today in this country who stood by us is graduating Today, congratulations. Somalia is an excellent sight for Upeace Africa, and Mr rector Upeace started in Somalia; as you well know, with no money, we are seeing today humans' ability to achieve things and make things out of nothing. We realized that many students, as I can see, just about 10 per cent of the applicants who applied to Upeace can be admitted. We need arguments for the tuition, and tuition to Upeace in Somalia can cover the cost, as you will notice. Today, out of the 18 PhD graduates, only two are women. We need deliberate support for women in Somalia. We require that positive marginalization, whereby we make conscious decisions to sponsor women to ensure they can attain the Master and PHD's qualifications. If you look at the tuition we charge in Somalia and the tuition we charge at other campuses, this is, In fact, free Education we are offering in Somalia. However, the high demand requires expanding our programs in Somalia, and I am happy that we successfully invited the rector. He agreed to come and see the work we are doing in Africa. I can't end this welcoming without requesting all of you to give a hand of applause to this handsome young man who came to persuade us, Dr Mohamed Osman. I'm also thankful to the staff of Upeace Somalia and Africa program; it is a journey which I don't mind taking again. Somalia is the best place for Upeace, and Upeace is here to stay in Somalia. Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the Secretary-General of the United Nations – Honorary President of UPEACE Council, the Chancellor of UPEACE, and the UPEACE Council, I am a bearer of warm greetings from the entire UPEACE Community and the United Nations Education Family to the people of Somalia on the second graduation ceremony and the first doctoral graduation ceremony of UPEACE outside the main campus.

Let's me express same ideas with regards to the global situation.

We live in an era of conflict and uncertainties.

The world is witnessing a rise in various conflicts, deep crises, and situations in which the use of force is present. War is part of the scenar-



io. Even nuclear danger is part of the agenda; - like in the decade of 60s with the missile crisis in Cuba - the slightest miscalculation or accident can produce an atomic disaster. As United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres noted: "We are one miscalculation away from nuclear annihilation".

The Covid-19 pandemic continues to create devastation and damages. It aggravated hereditary problems and created frictions of various kinds. It accentuated nationalist policies and protectionism. It highlighted the lack of solidarity in inter-state relations. Humanity is facing a global environmental crisis. This planetary crisis puts us before the greatest threat to humanity: the Anthropocene. The war expresses the use of force in different regions. In addition to the financial and economic crisis, there is currently a global recession. Inflation is affecting the planet. Hunger is increasing. All these situations generate instability and create high uncertainty.

Inequality is increasing in the world and within countries. The international order is in turmoil, even more so in the digital sphere. There is a lack of effective global regulation. Multilateralism and the democratic political systems are also in crisis. We have a responsibility, as humankind, for these crises. These are global phenomena. The atomic threat is global. The climate emergency is global, the issue of hunger is global. The same is true of democratic governance. The bottom line is that to confront these challenges and threats requires cooperation. Without cooperation, we have no peace. Without peace, there is no development. Without cooperation, we have no global security.

In situations of war, no rights can be exercised. Human rights are violated. It is necessary to establish peaceful relations, within the rule of law. Through dialogue, negotiation, and mediation, it is possible to exchange bombs for words. The power of dialogue must prevail over the violence of force.



This is ensured through the promotion of a Culture of Peace and Non-violence. This is part of the task of the University for Peace.

Mr. President,

On an occasion like this, it is perhaps important to start from the beginning:

The founding of the University for Peace can be traced to the thirty-third session of the General Assembly of the United Nations in 1978, where the President of Costa Rica, Rodrigo Carazo, proposed that a new University be created as a centre of higher learning and as a World Centre of Education for Peace. The President offered Costa Rica to host the University, which he considered should be established within the United Nations system. In its resolution 33/109, of 18 December 1978, titled "Proposal for the Establishment of the University for Peace," the Assembly took note of the proposal submitted by the President of Costa Rica and requested the Secretary-General to circulate the proposal for comment to all Member States, UNESCO, the Rector and Council of United Nations University and all other agencies as the Secretary-General estimated appropriate, and report to the General Assembly at its 34th Session.

The subsequent report of the Secretary General (A/34/496) also contained in the decision of the Executive Board of UNESCO and the opinion of the Council of United Nations University, which led the General Assembly to adopt Resolution 34/111 entitled "Establishment of a University for Peace."

Furthermore, on 5 December 1980, the General Assembly of the United Nations adopted Resolution 35/55 which sets out in its annex the International Agreement for the Establishment of the University for Peace. The Charter of the University is an integral part of that agreement. Forty-one (41) countries have become Signatory States to the UPEACE Charter. We are proud to say that at the recent 77th session of the General Assembly of the United Nations, Somalia became the 42nd Signatory State of the UPEACE Charter. With this accession, Somali students automatically benefit from a 30 percent discount in tuition towards their studies. Thank you, Mr. President, for this decision.

On 21 September 2021 – the International Day of Peace – during its first graduation ceremony in Somalia, 76 graduates received their UPEACE master's degree. This year, we are celebrating this important day on 2 December, which marks the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Convention for the Suppression of the Traffic in Persons and of the Exploitation of the Prostitution of Others through Resolution 317. The focus of this day is to eradicate contemporary forms of slavery such as trafficking in persons, sexual exploitation, and the worst forms of child labour, forced marriage and the forced recruitment of children for use in armed conflict.

The above resolution is significant for the work of UPEACE in three ways:

First, UPEACE just completed and launched its White Paper of Illicit Economies and Organized Crime in Africa, where the Africa Programme headed by Samuel Ewusi played an important role. A better knowledge of the roots of conflicts is essential to their transformation.

Second, the UPEACE Charter focuses the University's work on reducing obstacles to peace, through education for peace, in conformity with the United Nations Charter. The peacebuilding process that follows any conflict requires the re-establishment of the rule of law, pacific coexistence, and civil friendships. Women are victims of several crimes. They must be a central part of the solution. To restore the rule of law, it is essential to create trust and a safe environment for peaceful understanding.

University for Peace

Third, some of these challenges affect Somalia's post-conflict agenda, and the recruitment of young people for terrorist acts is one of the challenges facing Somalia. Children actively participate in hostilities, which makes them perpetrators and victims of the conflict; therefore, special programmes must be developed for them. To stop the violence, it is essential to stop hate speech. It is crucial to improve trust and mutual confidence.

To encourage peace, is necessary to expand democracy, trust, and the Rule of Law.

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen,

On 5 December 2020, UPEACE commemorated its 40th Anniversary.

The mission of the University, as stipulated in Article 2 of its Charter, is "to provide humanity with an international institution of higher education for peace and with the aim of promoting among all human beings the spirit of understanding, tolerance and peaceful coexistence, to stimulate cooperation among peoples and to help lessen obstacles and threats to world peace and progress, in keeping with the noble aspirations proclaimed in the Charter of the United Nations." Pursuant to its mission to help lessen obstacles and threats to peace, UPEACE established the Africa Programme in Africa's diplomatic capital of Addis Ababa in 2002, to assist African countries, regional organizations, and regional economic communities in their recurrent struggle to build peace in an otherwise conflict-ridden continent. After building capacity at the doctoral level through funded projects, UPEACE Africa has designed country and regional specific programmes aimed at addressing the key challenges to peace in the continent.

With capacity-building programmes spread across the continent in the form of short certificate and diploma courses, UPEACE Africa has implemented a specific master's Programme in Peace and Security designed to build capacity for members of the Uganda police. This programme was designed to strengthen the security sector in African countries will be extended to other countries in the continent.

In late 2018-early 2019, UPEACE took the extraordinary step to extend its programmes to Somalia, a country which for over two decades was involved in a fratricidal war and currently facing security challenges. Considering the monumental challenges facing Somalia, it was necessary to implement more programmes.

However, UPEACE opted to focus on 4 key areas at the master's level and one programme at the doctoral level, which we believe will contribute to Somalia's post conflict agenda. The programmes include:

- Master of Arts in Peace, Governance and Development
- Master of Arts in Environment Development and Peace
- Master of Arts in International Law and Human Rights
- Master of Arts in Disaster Resilience Leadership and Humanitarian Action
- Doctor of Philosophy in Peace, Governance and Development

Through these specific programmes, UPEACE has made a conscious and historical decision to assist Africa's most security-challenged nation in building sustainable peace and security.

The master's and doctoral programmes from which these students are graduating are the most multi-disciplinary, trans-disciplinary, multi-cultural and multi-national programmes ever designed by UPEACE. It is our view that Somalia needs much more than we offer, and we shall further discuss these needs with the government and see how UPEACE can be of further assistance.



We are confident that our work in Somalia will be specifically highlighted in future reports by the Secretary-General to the General Assembly of the United Nations as a critical Programme to enhance peace and security in Africa. Ladies and Gentlemen.

As you may have noticed and the students will confirm, this is a programme where students were taught and supervised by professors from different countries including South Africa, Cameroon, Botswana, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, Uganda, Kenya, Rwanda, Ethiopia, and the United Kingdom. This speaks volumes to the international, intercultural, and multidimensional nature of the programme, required in a fast-globalizing world.

To illustrate the unique nature of the programmes, the multidisciplinary and multinational complexion of the courses and teaching staff enabled the students to be taken out of their comfort zone as they were made to discuss issues affecting other African countries.

This had the effect of taking most of students away from their comfort zone and allowed both their imagination and perception to wander into the sacred coliseum of academic discourse, which is required for an increasingly complex world.

Against this backdrop, I can say with full assurance that you are building a more knowledgeable society that will contribute to preserving peace and security in the country, the sub-region, and Africa as a whole.

Finally, the importance of UPEACE programmes in Somalia cannot be overstated. This is further emphasized by UNESCO's charter, which states that "Since wars begin in the minds of men, it is in the minds of men that the construction of peace must begin." At UPEACE, we live by the motto: If we want peace, we must prepare peace.

Today, as we graduate the master's and doctoral students in Somalia, I want to emphasize UPEACE's commitment to accompany the International Community and the people of Somalia in its pursuit of peace for all the people of this beautiful country. As UPEACE settles down in Somalia, it will require the support of the Somali government in terms of providing permanent structures to facilitate its work.

As the late Professor Ali Mazrui said, "Superiority between individuals depends on who owns what. But Superiority between nations depends on who knows what." Let us join to build a knowledge-based society in Somalia and Africa, which will in turn minimize the obstacles to peace in Somalia.

Congratulations to the newest UPEACE Alumni, congratulations to your families and relatives for the support that allowed you to achieve this great milestone. Be generous and share your knowledge to build a better future for Somalia, Africa, and the world.

If we want peace, prepare peace.

PRESIDENT DR HASSAN SHEIKH MOHAMUD SPEECH

First and foremost, I congratulate my friends and fellow students who are graduating today- both the Master's and PhD classes- and those who graduated in previous years. I want to tell you that you are all part of Somalia's new dawn.

Let me briefly speak about our country's Education history, which is a huge historical and exciting journey. This, however, doesn't include the last 30 years.

It is a rare occurrence in the World for a Country to build its Education system from scratch until it reaches its highest level, then it collapses entirely and reaches its lowest level.

Then the education system is rebuilt again to the level it is today.



Somalia today has twice the number of students it had during the central Government's downfall in the early 90s. It could be argued that if the Government did not collapse, we would have thrice or four times more students today.

My Education Journey that brought me here today to receive my PhD from Upeace University can be traced back to my efforts in improving Education in our country and particularly to the historical incident at the Manabolyo intersection, where in the early 90s, I established the first school in a time when different factions ruled the capital. That day I witnessed how our education system was destroyed.

However, today I stand here to bear witness once again to how we have risen to the highest level as we celebrate in Mogadishu for the first time an event where PhD degrees are being awarded in our own country. This is the first time this happening in our 62 years of independence.

This is an excellent example that we are chasing to recover what we missed during the period when we lost everything. Once again, let me congratulate my friends- the men and women students who got time to study despite their busy schedules with work and family issues.

From the look of things, it is evident in this room I'm the oldest among my friends who are receiving their PhD. Most of them are Youth, which is clear evidence that no single Somali person today can have an excuse for not getting an Education because of a busy schedule and lack of time. Those excuses have ended today.

I registered for the PhD In 2018 when I was one of the leading opposition figures in our country. You all remember the struggle we have gone through to ensure the elections are held. I never gave up on my studies despite the political pressure. I continued with my studies even after I was elected the President. On the other hand, you can also see the gap between my PhD and my master's degree, which I got in 1988.

I was supposed to finish the Course before becoming President, but I'm glad to see some of my lectures sitting here today. I didn't face many challenges in pursuing this PHD, maybe because of my experience in the field I chose, which is Peace, Development and Governance.



The Course has also widened my perspective on peace, and I now understand many issues that I did not know before I started the Course.

My main message is that peace can exist and nothing can prosper without peace, so peace is the central pillar of humanity. In terms of development, it is only when you have the opportunity to think, research, and decide that you can make progress.

There are 17 districts in Mogadishu, and I remember during the difficult times, as a family, we were forced to move from one section to another in search of illusive peace. We would sometimes stay in one district for a few days or weeks and then get uprooted and forced to move again.

In later years, when I worked as a researcher, research coordinator, and deputy director of the research Centre, I travelled extensively throughout Somalia. I visited every district of Somalia. I have even seen tiny communities in those ten years I have moved around. People all over the country kept asking me one question, and this was the question: From your perspective, how do you see that Somalia can come back to a functioning state? And instead of getting answers to that question from people living in very remote areas, they immediately shared with me grievances and problems, such as displacements, and violence, that were done to them by state actors.

These are the challenges we must deal with as we continue to improve our efforts towards state-building. On the other hand, it is a fact that every Somali belongs to a clan, but that does not mean that the clan should be a factor that causes division among us. We need to embrace diversity if we want to achieve a strong state.

Somalia, at the moment, has skilled people. And thanks to Upeace, we now have graduates from different fields such as environmental science, peace and development etc. We must ensure we tap into this resource and encourage our Youth to take leadership positions.

I may not be here in a few years to come, and if I am around, I may not be helpful. Some of you sitting here today may be in my current position in future.

I would like you to think differently, and if we want to achieve progress, we need to act and do differently from what we have been doing in the last thirty years.

Finally, I am pleased that the University named the Mogadishu campus after me. That is a tremendous honour and even more responsibility. In that regard, I will establish a scholarship fund for a hundred PhD students studying at the Upeace campus in Mogadishu. The fund will be offered to the best minds and students in Somalia. I promise you that the fund will be handled fairly, and there will be no political or clan considerations.
